## RAILWAY LUNCHEON CLUB SCHOFIELDS

It is unusual to find a station which has had three different locations in our lifetime, but on 17 November, about 40 members from Luncheon Club visited one such station— Schofields.

The first station was opened in 1870 on the Down side of the single Blacktown—Richmond line, and, with some additions over time, served the area for just over 100 years. In 1973, the Askin Government promised electrification of the Richmond line, and as part of these works a new station was built for Schofields and opened in 1975. It was still on a single line, but built on the opposite, (Up) side of the line. With the duplication works currently in progress on the Richmond line, a new, and third, station for Schofields, is being built and will be opened in 2011. This new station will be located some 800 metres on the Sydney side of the second station, is of island platform configuration and is primarily built at this site to serve a large, albeit yet-to-be-built, housing development.

The 1975 station is unique in that its platform building utilised the 'Willcroft-Terrapin' prefabricated box building system, utilising 50mm thick Styrofoam clad in a composite fibrous material. Quakers Hill and Marayong received similar buildings in the 1970s electrification project, but these have since been replaced, leaving Schofields as the sole survivor on the railways of this building system. The platform face is believed to be the last instance when the combination of old rail and concrete poured in situ was used for a NSW passenger platform.

With wooden poles supporting the overhead, track made in 1964 fixed to wooden sleepers with dog spikes, and with older style shops and even a produce store nearby, Schofields presents somewhat of an 'old world charm'. But not for much longer.

The next outing for the Railway Luncheon Club, and the last for this year, is to the Petersham Training College. We will meet at the college's reception which is down the stairs and ramp in Trafalgar Street at 11am. In January 2011, for those interested we are organising a 'meet the staff' visit to the ARHS offices at Redfern. More details in the January Newsletter.
