RAILWAY LUNCHEON CLUB DULWICH HILL

The Light Rail service to Dulwich Hill opened on 27 March, so after a few months to let it "settle down", the Luncheon Club made it an outing on 18 June. The size of our group (a bit over 60), made it necessary to split up and utilise three different tram services to go the full distance of 12.8km from Central to Dulwich Hill. After meeting up at the new Dulwich Hill Tram (or Light Rail) station, we were treated to a presentation from Stephen Halgren of the history of the area, the suburban railway, the goods lines and Dulwich Hill Station itself.

It was noted that it is a pity that in the planning process for the light rail, a better access from the Light Rail Station to Dulwich Hill Railway Station couldn't have been provided, and it was noted also that with three modes of public transport (train, light rail and a nearby bus service), Dulwich Hill does have a commuter car park on the southern side.

It turned out to be a truly memorable day in perfect weather, which was capped off by lunch at the General Gordon Hotel at Sydenham, a few minutes train ride away. Our thanks go to Stephen for his expert commentary and for his informative notes which are now on the website.

The next outing is on Wed 16 July and we are going to Stanwell Park to look at the old Otford Tunnel and station site. The tour will be led by John Oakes, and we meet at Stanwell Park Station at 9.18 am after the arrival of the service which departs Central (No.25 platform) at 8.13am. Lunch will be at the Royal Hotel at Sutherland. Due to the distances involved, a bus has been hired and it is necessary to book for this outing. In August we are going to Teralba where Ed Tonks will show us the history of this station and the surrounding area. June Members' Meeting

Entertainment at the June meeting was by Neville Pollard with a talk entitled 'Terrorist or Trainspotter - Photographing Trains in Uganda.' He told of his experience photographing an old diesel hydraulic locomotive at Kampala station last April where he was not permitted to photograph it anywhere else than under the station awning. Photographing inside the cab frightened the daylight out of one of the drivers. All this was due to the fear of terrorism from Al Shabaab militants from Somalia who have infiltrated neighbouring Kenya. Well maintained carriages on the opposite platform cannot not be used because of the deplorable state of the track between Kampala and Jinja.

Neville was apprehended by two soldiers from the Ugandan Army for photographing the rail bridge over the Nile at Jinja, the second largest city. The problem was that the power station that supplies much of Uganda's power might have been able to be seen in the background of his image and, therefore, be used for terrorist purposes. He was released after much talking and deleting one of the images in their presence.
