## The Ski Tube & Floriade Tour 27 & 28 September 2014

Twenty five Members and friends departed Central on time at 6.57am on the Explorer service to Canberra on a fine spring morning on Saturday 27 September. Our train was diverted to run via the Main South due to track work on the East Hills line. It was noted that the usual Saturday Griffith cars were not attached for this trip. Morning tea was served as we proceeded through the Southern Highlands to arrive 12 minutes late at Goulburn. This was reduced to a six minute deficit on arrival at Canberra. Monaro Coaches arrived with friendly driver Mal Risby in command and after loading our luggage, departed south at 11.30am for Bullock Flat, stopping for our packet lunch at the park in Cooma.

Arriving at the Ski Tube, we were met by Greg Isele who introduced our tour guide Bill Moxom for the inspection of the control room, workshop facilities and stabling yard for the Ski Tube rail cars.

As the extension from Perisher to Mt Blue Cow had closed the previous Wednesday, we were only able to travel to Perisher, in the now almost 30-year old carriages. Most took the advantage of checking out the tunnel and the rack rail from the front car as we climbed the grade to Perisher.

On arrival at Perisher, an inspection of the station and the interchange to Mt Blue Cow was provided. All took the time between trains to check out the remaining snow at the chair lifts before rejoining for the service for the slower downhill return trip to Bullock Flat. Our coach returned us to Canberra for the overnight stay at the Diplomat Hotel in Griffith located almost opposite the Canberra Railway Station.

A fine buffet dinner was enjoyed as was our breakfast on Sunday morning. Departure was at 9.00am on Sunday for Floriade and the alternate destination, The Australian War Memorial preceded by a short tour via Anzac Avenue and a quick look at All Saints Anglican Church, Ainslie, the former No.1 Mortuary Station building at Rookwood. This unique building was taken down stone by stone, re-erected and then dedicated as the Church in November 1959. Those in the group who elected to visit The Australian War Memorial alighted and then it was off to Commonwealth Park on the shores of Lake Burley Griffin.

The Floriade display was in full bloom with very colourful display themes. This was accompanied by musical items from the sound stage and travelling street theatre events.

At 2.30pm our coach transferred us to the ARHS ACT Division Museum at Kingston for a very welcome afternoon tea prepared by the Museum Manager and his wife. Following a look through the public exhibits, Museum Manager Andrew Simpson conducted a behind the scenes tour of the museum. All rejoined the coach at 4.30pm for the short run to Canberra Railway Station.

Our return to Sydney departed on time at 5.20pm. An evening meal was provided from the Buffet, with on time running to Campbelltown where an operational delay saw our late return to Sydney Central at 9.55pm. Thanks to all who made the trip the success it was.
