The line from Fassifern to Toronto closed on 10 March 1990 after a life of 124 years, firstly as a private tramway and after 1910 as a government railway. The platform of the intermediate station, Blackalls Park, remains as does the platform and station building at Toronto, the latter being restored and occupied by the Lake Macquarie and District Historical Society.

On 15 July 2015, our large group of over 60 traced the remains of this line and these facilities, followed by lunch at the Toronto Workers Club.

Good weather and much to see made the outing one to remember and our thanks go to Ed Tonks and Stuart Sharp for their valued commentary on the day and to Spencer Ross for his assistance. Also our thanks to Lake Macquarie and District Historical Society.

The next outing will be to Camellia on 19 August 2015. This outing will be led by John Oakes and we meet at Camellia Station at 10.18am, following the arrival of the down service. ## Vale Frank McQuade

Well known train and tram photographer and enthusiast Frank McQuade passed away on Sunday 5 July after a short illness. Frank grew up in the Lane Cove area where he developed his lifelong love of trams and while still a school boy he also became interested in trains and spent considerable time around Hornsby loco depot and riding the North Shore shunting trip which he sometimes fired and drove.

After finishing school he continued his interest in steam power by training as a boilermaker and spent much of his working life on the tools and as a foreman boilermaker. He was a keen photographer and for a period had his own photographic business.

He was a long-time member of the ARHS and his contribution to the work of the RRC included the scanning of many photographs. He was also a keen member of the Sydney Tramway Museum being involved in its photographic collection. He was also a driver, the officer in charge and for a period its Secretary.Frank will go down in memories as one of the "characters" of Sydney Tramway Museum and for that matter of transport heritage in general. He was a person of often strong opinions which he often pressed very strongly. He made his opinions known far and wide as no doubt the letters editors of the Sydney Morning Herald and the Melbourne Age would attest and he had no love of politicians. He had some wondrous memories to recount and many of these will also be remembered by those of us who knew him.

Vale Frank. May he rest in peace while dreaming of the North Shore shunting trip and the days he rode it.
